

End of Mail-In Voting

What's wrong with mail-in ballots:

- No chain of custody you don't know who received the ballot
- You also don't know whether the person who signed it filled it out
- No guarantee of a secret ballot someone could watch the voter vote

Do not fit the C.R.S. definition of a ballot because it's not possible to be sure the person who filled it out was eligible

Analysis of President Trump's statement on mail-in voting:

<u>Shawn Smith</u> "This is the most important act and objective of POTUS' administration. With it, all is possible. Without it, every other effort is transient."

<u>Seth Keshel</u> "President Donald Trump took to Truth Social to tell us how he really feels about mail-in voting"

Ada Nestor "And yet, the grassroots never gave up. We kept showing up at meetings, pressing the issue on local radio, organizing town halls, and building awareness at the community level. While leadership was counting consulting dollars, the base was counting the cost of losing their elections, and their country."

Emerald Robinson "Democrats should be applauding this as well."

Patrick Byrne: (20 minutes in) "[The bad guys] have been manipulating elections for 20 years in 72 nations."

The <u>Babylon Bee</u> on mail-in voting: "Democrats alleged that any move to ban mail-in ballots would disenfranchise millions of dead people who vote Democrat in every American election."

Another angle: check out <u>this case</u> filed in Colorado a few days ago attacking election fraud in voter registrations: Kevin Lundberg says, "The remedy recommended is simple to describe but will be difficult (yet essential) to accomplish: <u>follow the law for the 2026 election</u>."

France banned mail-in voting in 1975 due to fraud Mexico banned mail-in voting in 1992 due to fraud Belgium banned mail-in voting in 2018 – due to fraud. Sweden does not permit mail-in voting. Italy does not permit mail-in voting. Ukraine does not permit mail-in voting. Russia does not permit mail-in voting. Japan does not permit mail-in voting. No middle eastern country permits mail-in voting. No Latin country permits mail-in voting.

Rep. Brandi Bradley on **Colorado Special Session** beginning Thursday August 21st: Polis plans to protect Planned Parenthood funding, expand SNAP benefits, and rush AI regulations. Bradley, however, is presenting a bill to prohibit Medicaid spending on abortion and gender procedures, stop funding medical services for unlawful residents, and redirect Medicaid money back to its core services. She asks for citizen involvement supporting her bill; text her team for more info at 303-263-4775.



Tools for Involvement


(Operation and Maintenance of Your Party and Your Country)

The next ExComm meetings will be August 25th and September 20th. ExComm voting members include county officers and district captains. Precinct leaders, although not ExComm voting members, are welcome to attend and may address the meeting during the open forum. The meetings are livestreamed and recorded.

The September 20th ExComm meeting will be held with the Central Committee (CentComm) meeting which has been called to vote on the bylaws, at 12310 E. Parkview Dr. Aurora 80011. For the CentComm meeting, voting members include precinct leaders, district captains, county party officers, and elected officials within the county. Please refer to the Central Committee Meeting Call for more information.

September 27th is the State Central Committee meeting - voting members include county officers and county bonus members.

October 1st is the Lincoln Day Dinner Evening Reception with the actual dinner on October 2nd. The October ExComm meeting will be October 22nd, and the November ExComm meeting November 19th.

Look for the autumn ACGOP newsletter to come out in October. If you have information Arapahoe Republicans need to know, please send it in!


